#### **Session Outline**

#### **Introduction: 20 minutes**

- What do we know about a village? What is the recipe for making a village?
- Look at PowerPoint and Google Earth
- Whole class mind map on whiteboard What would St Leonard's tell us about Flamstead if the church could talk?

#### **Activity: 30 minutes**

- Children to create a map of Flamstead retelling what they have learnt.
- Write a postcard home describing Medieval Flamstead.

#### Plenary: 10 minutes

• Children could share their postcards about Flamstead.

- What do you think is important when creating a village?
