



However, 500 years ago the church walls would have been richly decorated.

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




## Painted Murals in Medieval Churches

Painted murals expressed people's devotion to God.

They told stories from the Bible.





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#### Who created the Murals?

- The murals were painted over a long period of time by monks, travelling artists, and local people.
- Their styles came from many traditions and sources.







# Painting shared Christian stories

- Artists followed pattern books to give them ideas.
- This is the Doom Painting.
- Once it was full of colour.
- Today, we see part of an 18<sup>th</sup> century Doom painting (top left) on top of 14<sup>th</sup> and possibly 15<sup>th</sup> century Doom paintings.





# The Doom Painting

- Christ is in the centre on a rainbow.
- This is the Day of Judgement









# **Doom Paintings in Europe**

- You could find the same style and content of paintings in many medieval churches in Europe.
- This is the Doom painting in St Thomas's Church, Salisbury.



#### How were the paints made?

- There were no decorating shops or ready-made paints in medieval times
- The paint had to be made by the artist








# Artists' Old Paint Recipes for White and Black

#### White paint


- Use chalk or lead
- Mix with glue from animal skins or egg white



#### Black paint

- Use charcoal or soot from a fire
- Mix with glue or egg white for working and to stick to a surface

# Artists' Old Paint Recipes for Red and Blue



#### Red (and orange and brown) paint

- Dig up ochre in clay and cook it until it turns the shade wanted
- Mix with glue or egg white to fix the pigment **Blue** paint
- Buy the mineral Azurite from traders and grind it down
- Mix with glue or egg white (called a "binder")

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## Artists' Old Paint Recipes for Green and Yellow



**Green** paint (a dangerous recipe not used now)

- Mix copper with vinegar to create Verdigris (very toxic!)
- Scrape off the crust and mix with glue or egg

**Yellow** paint (a dangerous recipe not used now)


- Grind the mineral Orpiment containing Arsenic (very toxic!) Better not lick your brush!
- Mix with glue or egg to fix the mineral

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# The Reformation

- In 1534, Henry VIII became the head of the English Church
- He began the English Reformation, which challenged the worship, beliefs, and rules of the Catholic Church
- From then, artworks began to be painted or whitewashed over
